The American Dream: Tragedy and Triumph



Receiving a Habitat for Humanity home has been one of the greatest blessings our family has ever received. We immigrated to America with \$500 in our pockets and hopes of the American Dream in our hearts. Owning our own land and raising our family in a safe and loving home has always been central to that dream. For our family, with two of our three children having cerebral palsy, owning a space that could accommodate them was always especially important to us, but always seemed unattainable. Our first years in the US were characterized by our moves between multiple apartment complexes in low income areas with high crime rates and drug infestations. The sounds of music and gunshots were often heard through the night. We lived all cramped together for almost a decade before God gave us the beautiful gift of a home.

When we received our Habitat for Humanity home back in 2009, it was as though a decade of prayers had suddenly been answered all at once. We were suddenly transported into a safe and quiet neighborhood, into a home with an expansive garden and enough rooms to house all of us.

We had trouble sleeping the first few nights in the house as the noise we'd grown so accustomed to hearing throughout the night was no longer there. The silence was almost frightening.

Eventually we grew appreciative of the silence and began a new life in our home. We celebrated birthdays, Christmases, and got to know our neighbors. Unfortunately, in the fall of 2011, we found out that our oldest son, Yohenes, was diagnosed with terminal liver cirrhosis. He passed away in June of the following year. He spent his last days and breathed his last breath in our house and we have since turned his room into our family prayer room. Additionally, our youngest son, Yonas, graduated from high school and we celebrated his graduation from Yale University with two degrees in Sociology and Molecular, Cellular, and Developmental Biology, in May. We will also be celebrating his successes in our home.

This house has been one of the greatest blessings we've received as a family. It stands as a monument to our family and allows us to remember where we have been and keep our eyes fixed on the promise of what God has for us in the future. This home has grown with us and shaped itself to become what we've needed – a safe refuge, a place of mourning, and a place of celebration.

Owning a home is central to attaining the American Dream and helping others to achieve their dreams is the American way.

Habitat is a Ministry

Gwinnett Habitat gets many requests from volunteers who want to help, but this particular email came from Habitat for Humanity International. The Finance Department from the international office in Atlanta wanted to volunteer with the home repair program called A Brush With Kindness. While their professional jobs may have been in finance, the volunteer group offered a variety of technical skills and were matched with a client in Lawrenceville with a variety of needs.

On the day of the project, the volunteer group showed up and some immediately started painting while others climbed the stepladders to clean the gutters before the gutters could be repaired. There were 1-2 others who started the process of installing safety bars in the bathroom while someone else replaced light bulbs. While there was lots of laughter, the volunteer group got right to work and was ready for a break when lunch arrived.

As the group invited the client to join them for sandwiches, the conversation turned to the client. She was an elderly lady with a delightful personality who was also a widow after losing her husband years ago. This woman was no longer able to maintain her house, and her daughter, who lived 45 minutes away, was only able to help when she could make the trip. The client had lost part of her leg due to various health issues years ago, but she was able to get around in her wheelchair with relative ease. The only thing that bothered this lovely lady was that she could not come and go as she pleased. While she could usually get a ride to the store or to the doctor, church was not easily accessible. In order to attend, she had to rely on her daughter to come pick her up and and drive her the 45 minutes to and from.

When the team leader from the Finance Department heard this, he spoke up. "Habitat is a ministry. It is more than building or repairing homes. It is a ministry in that it cares for people and many of their needs." With that comment, he said that he would start calling around to find a church with a wheelchair accessible vehicle and one that was closer. Within a few days, the client had a regular ride to church and a new church home. This was a nice reminder that Habitat is indeed more than hammers and nails. Habitat is a ministry.

Grant Funds and Donations Bring Community Together

Low-income elderly and disabled homeowners in Gwinnett County have friends in high places who want to help them with critical home repair.

Primerica, Scott Hudgens Family Foundation, Jackson EMC Foundation and the Community Foundation for NE Georgia awarded us funding this spring to help meet the needs of these low-income homeowners by supporting A Brush with Kindness, a critical home repair and preservation program.

If those weren't enough high powered friends, Cardinal Health, Christ the King Baptist Church, Christ the King Lutheran Church, McKendree United Methodist Church, First United Methodist Church of Lawrenceville, Peachtree Ridge H.S. Habitat Club, and the Rotary Club of Peachtree Corners joined in and brought both volunteers and donations that helped complete 13 more projects for these deserving homeowners.

The volunteers are critical to get the projects completed and to make them affordable.

The foundation grants and corporate funding provide us the capability to purchase materials, tools and equipment that the donations don't cover and to use contractors and licensed plumbers and electricians to complete some of the work we run into that our volunteers can't do or shouldn't do because of safety concerns," said Barry Blakely, program coordinator. Our goal is to complete between 45 and 50 projects annually.

Since July 1, 2016, 31 other projects have been completed by 21 other corporations and organizations that provided the volunteers and donated funds. All told, 32 different organizations and a multitude of volunteers joined together to make a positive impact on our community. You Rock, Gwinnett!
